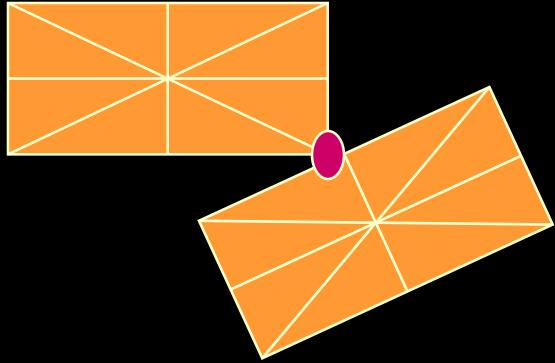

OBJECTIVES



- Masonry structure = granular material
- Rigid or deformable blocks+interaction laws

Discrete approach with Deformable blocks



Advantage : Ability to introduce the behaviour of the blocks (elasticity, plasticity...) and damage criterion

Drawback : More unknown variables, more calculation time

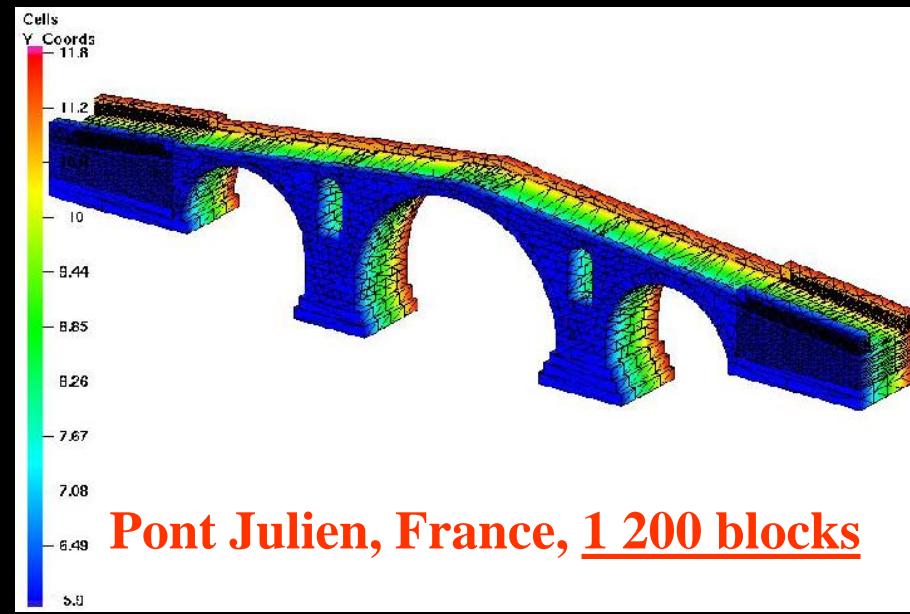
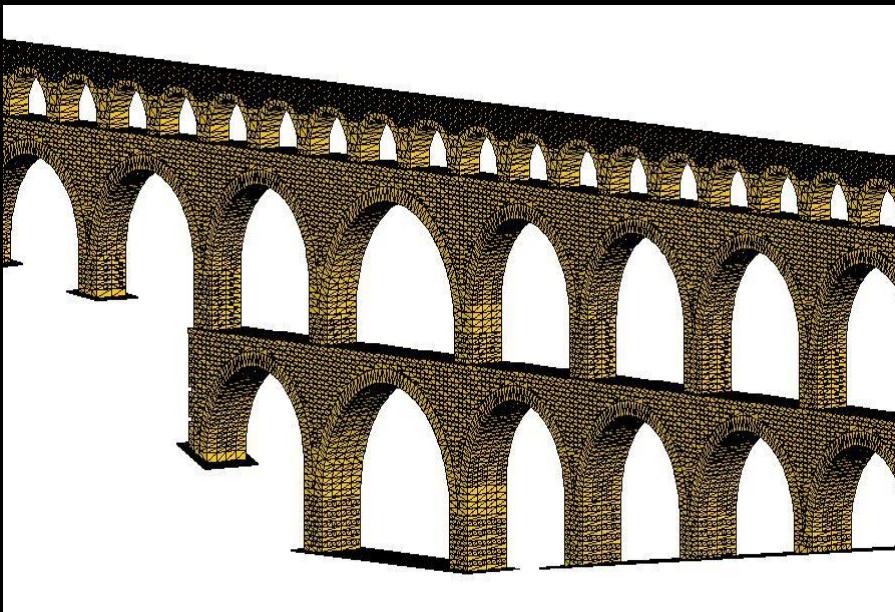
Example : a 85 block wall, 300 time steps

Deformable blocks : 1mn48s (8FEM TRI3 by block)

Rigid blocks : 0mn27s

→ **Comput. time(Deformable) \approx 4*Comput. time (Rigid)**

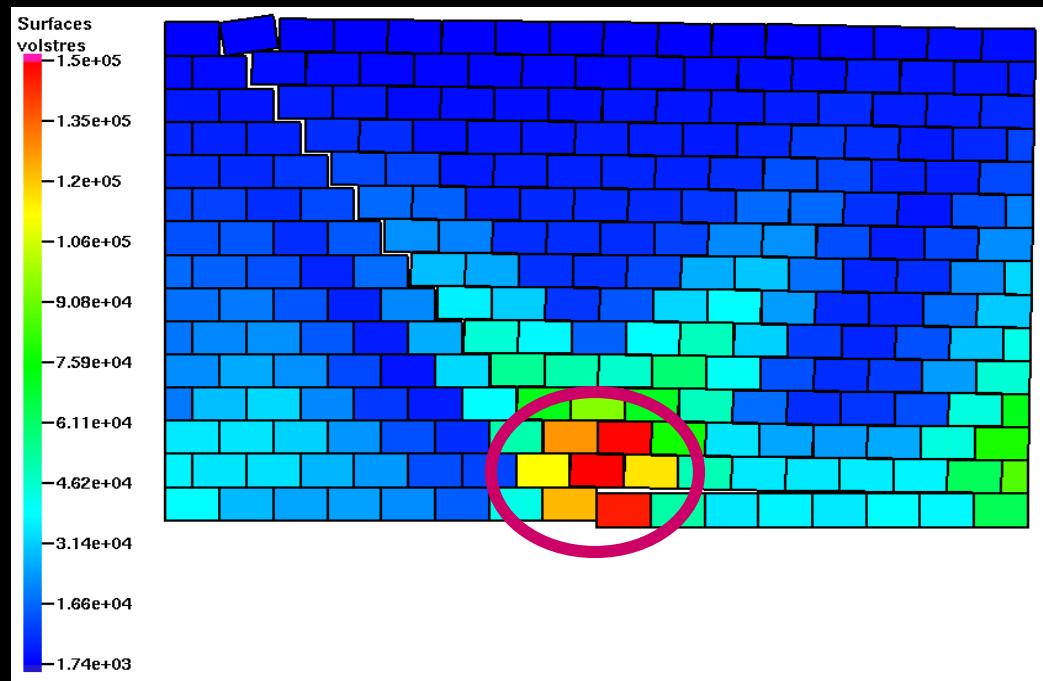

PROPOSED SOLUTION

MIXED ‘DEFORMABLE /RIGID’ APPROACH

CRITICAL ZONES == DEFORMABLE

NON CRITICAL ZONES == RIGID



PROBLEM

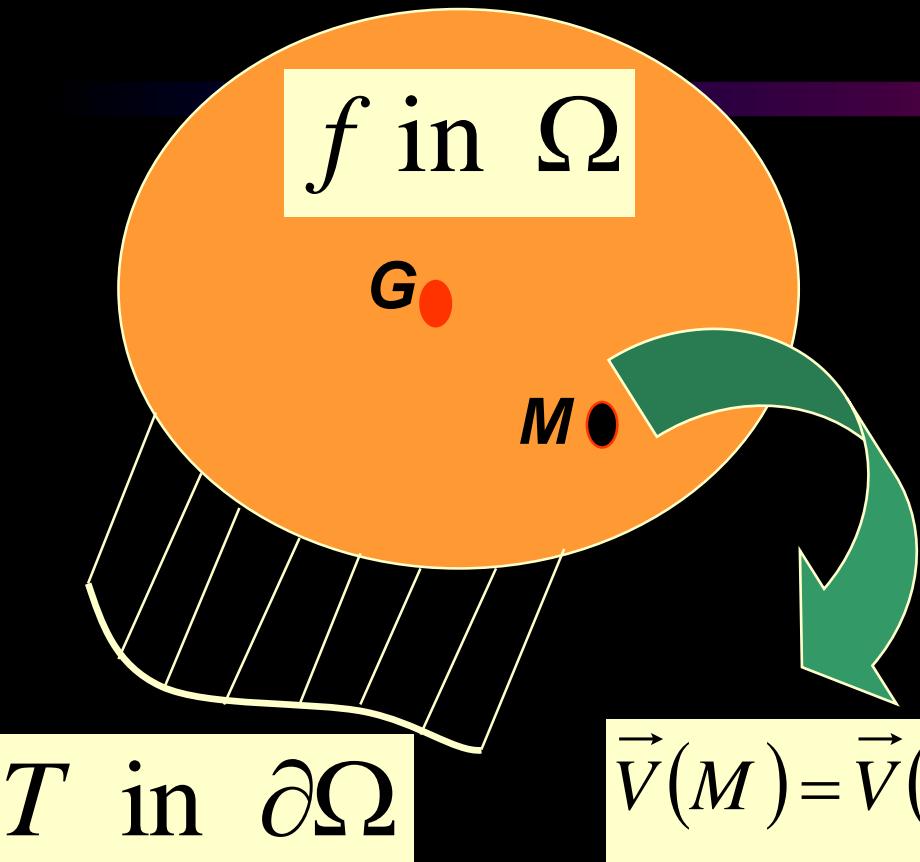


The static definition of the average stress tensor in the case of rigid blocks ‘loses’ its symmetry in dynamic cases.



Necessity to take into account the inertial forces in the expression of the ‘stress tensor’

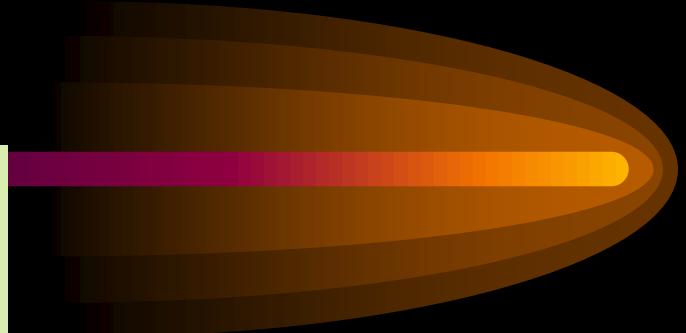

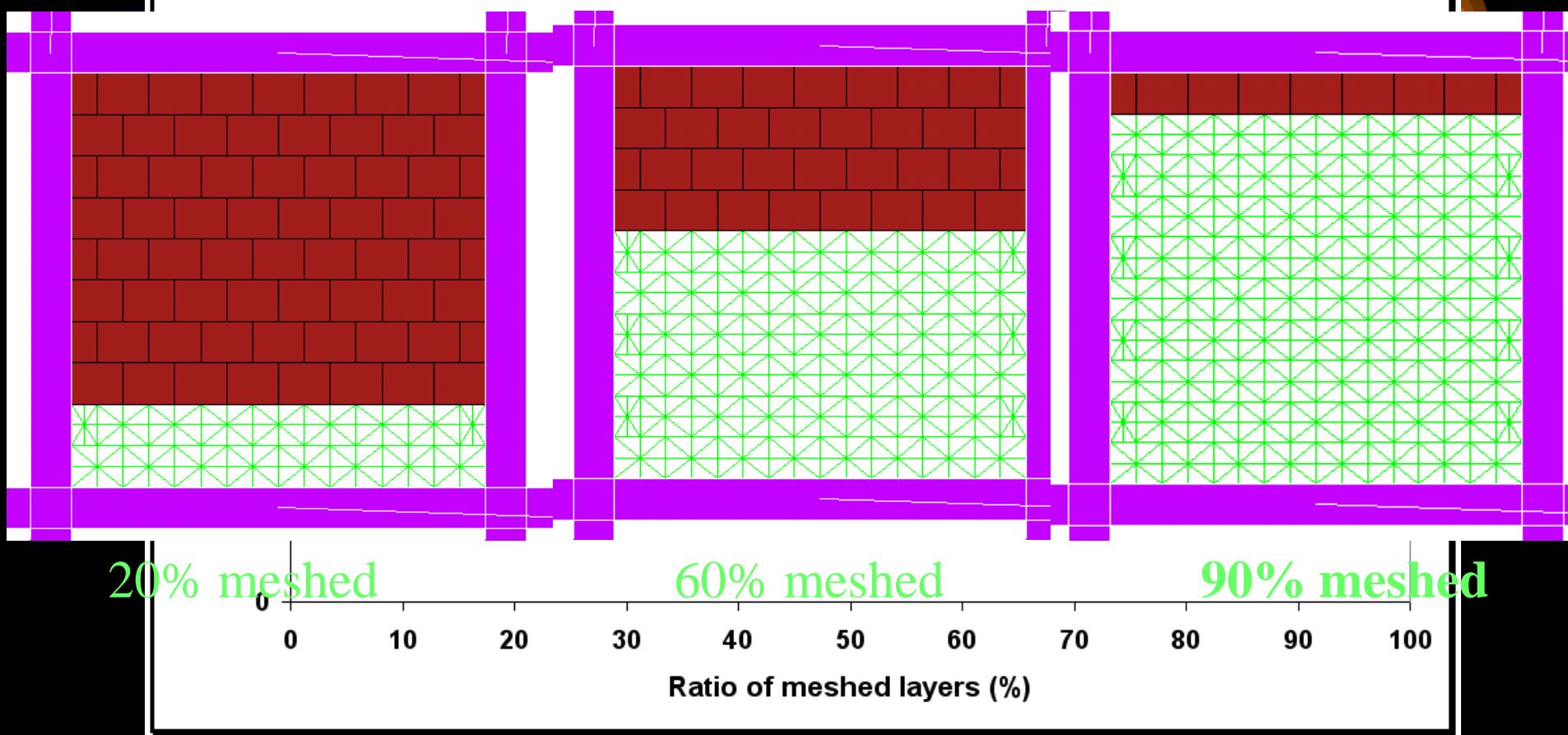

Comput. time(Deformable) \approx 4*Comput. time (Rigid)

Conclusions and perspectives



- The **rigid** calculation is fast but gives **average** information on the blocks ;
- The **deformable** approach is more **accurate** but more « time consuming »
- The **mixed** approach is well adapted to **large samples** ;
- The average stress tensor in rigid blocks takes into account the **inertia forces** and allows to study dynamic cases with a mixed approach
- Real case structure modelling are possible

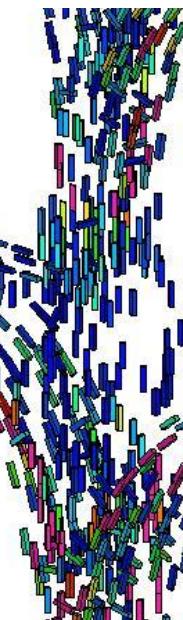
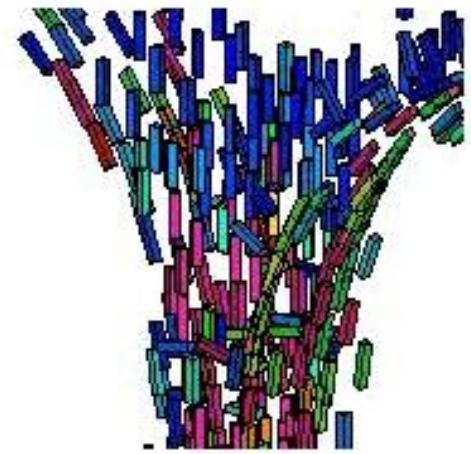
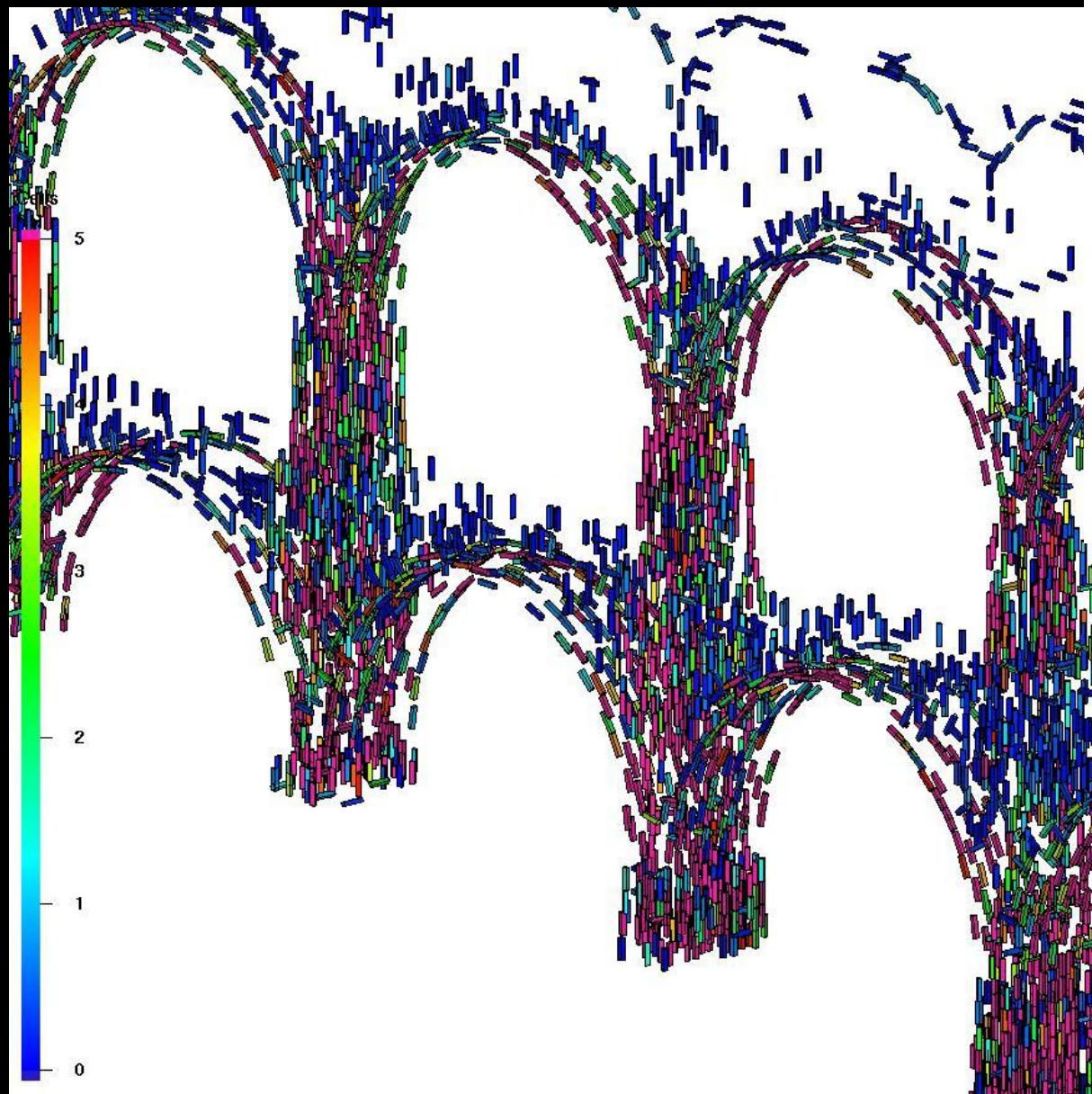
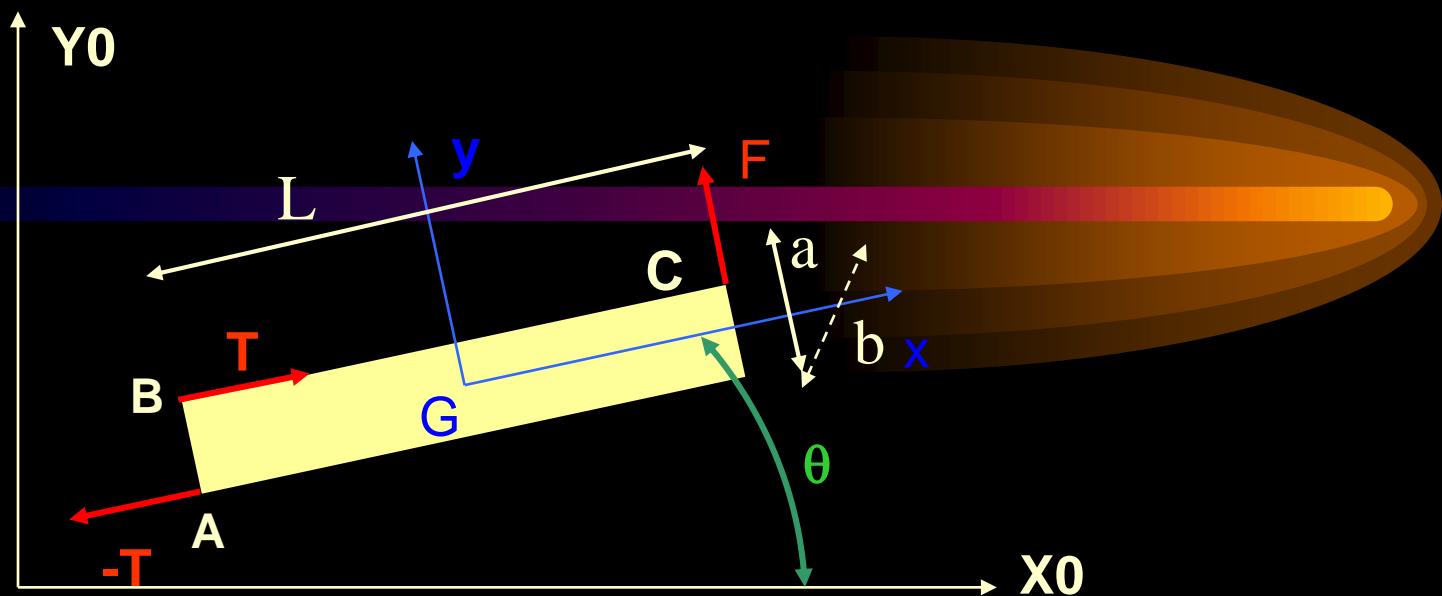


Illustration example of the tensor symmetry
