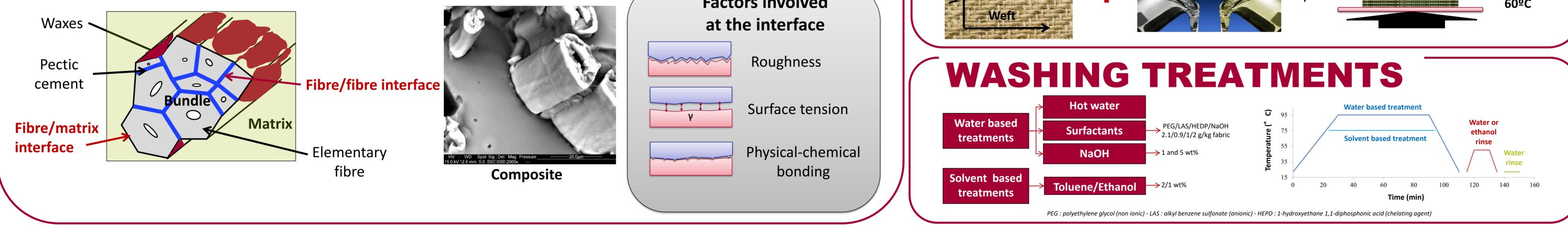


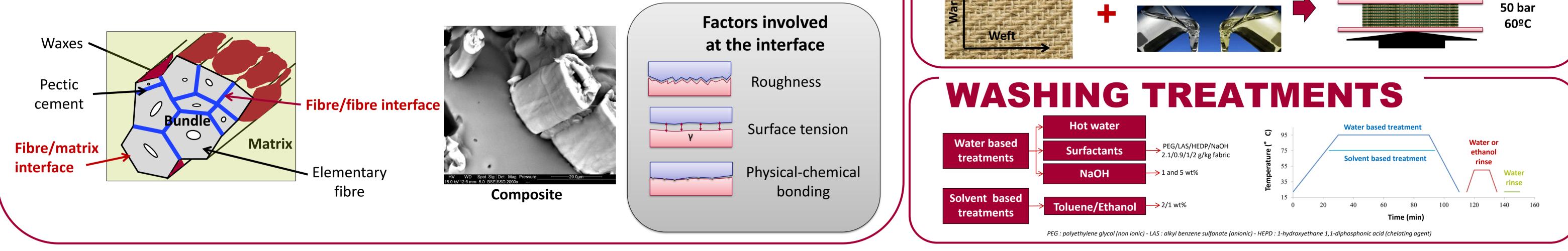

CONTEXT

Natural fibres based composites are increasingly used mainly because of their low density and positive life cycle assessment. Nevertheless an improvement of their mechanical properties is required. A better control of the fibre/matrix interface and of the intra-fibrillar interface within the fibre bundles has to be established.

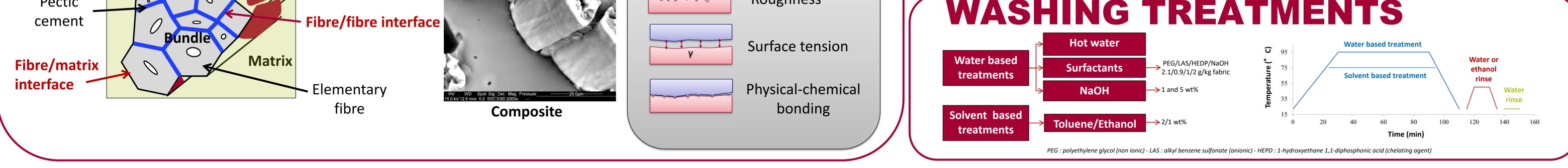

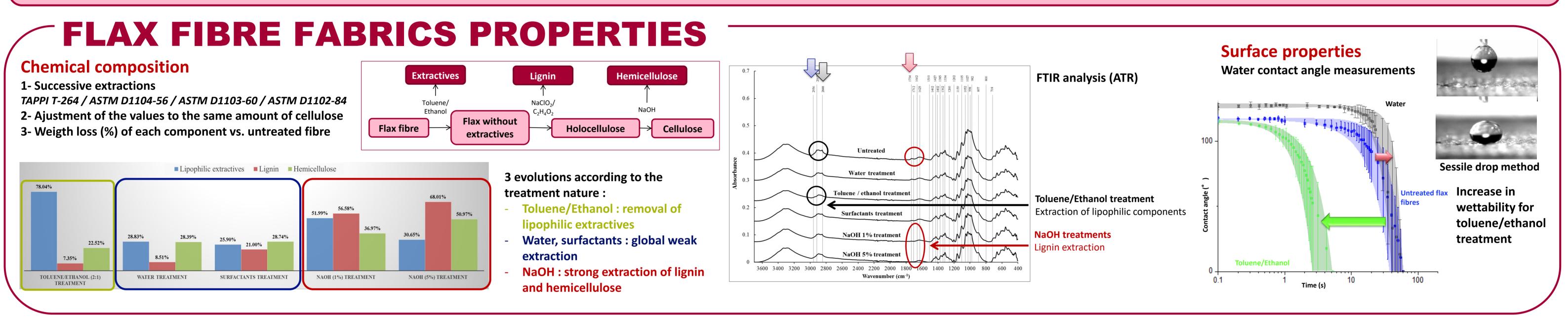
Quasi-unidirectional flax fibre fabric Structural epoxy system UD29, FRD, France Resin 1800/hardener 1805 **Composite processing : Thermo-compression** 8 layers of UD29 impregnated with epoxy resin during 6h at 60°C for curing + 15h at 60°C of post-curing





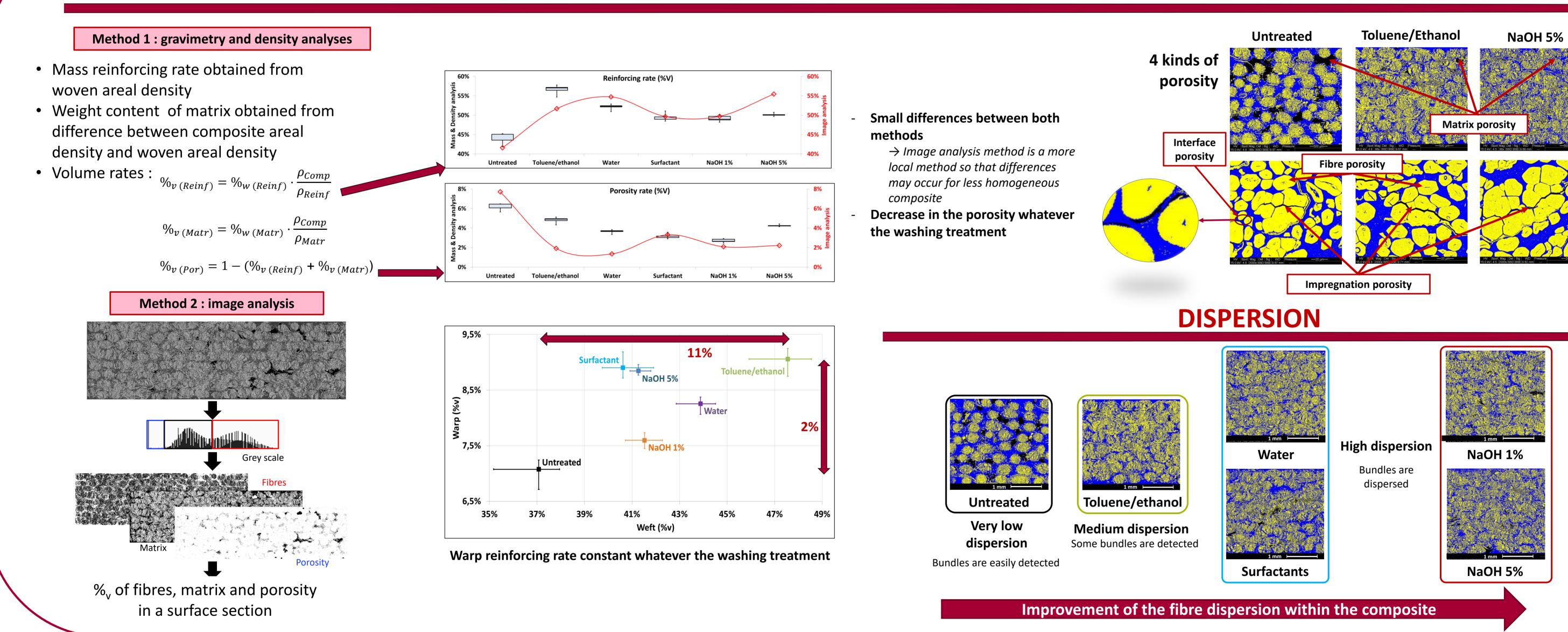

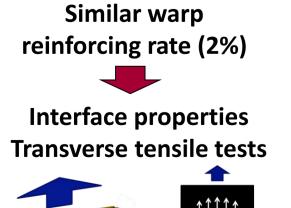
FLAX / EPOXY COMPOSITE MICROSTRUCTURE

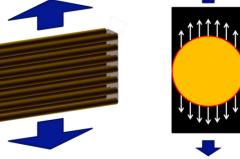

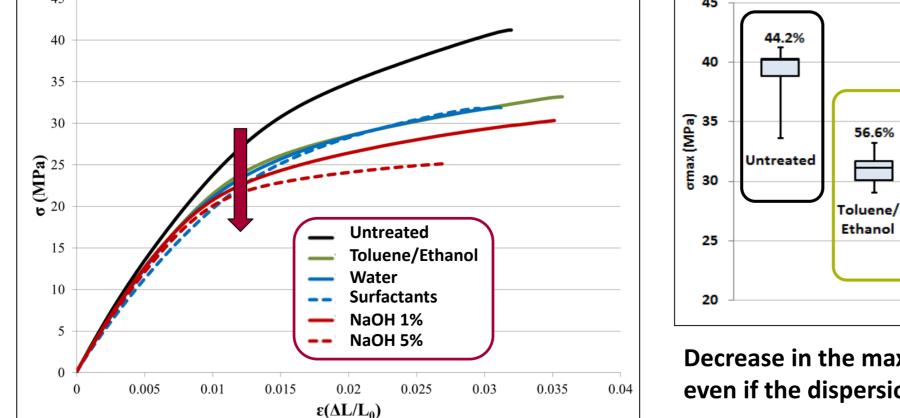


FLAX / EPOXY COMPOSITE MECHANICAL

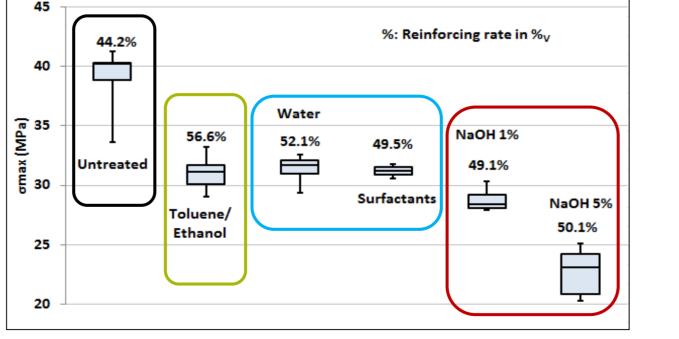

Shift of the elastic-plastic transition to lower strength for more drastic extraction condition



Decrease in the maximum strength for each treatment even if the dispersion was improved

Two assumptions:

- Bad elementary fibre / matrix interface
- Fibre components removal \rightarrow variations in the
- stress accommodation within the composite

CONCLUSIONS

Microstructure :

<u>Chemical composition</u> : Toluene/Ethanol : extraction of lipophilic components Water, surfactants : weak extraction **NaOH : strong extraction of lignin and hemicellulose**

> - Decrease in the porosity rate, mainly matrix porosity, whatever the treatment

- Improvement of the fibre dispersion within the composite depending on the treatment

Decrease in the transverse mechanical properties due to **Mechanical properties :** either a bad elementary fibre / matrix interface, or variations in the stress accommodation within the composite
